You're invited to a special ribboncutting ceremony and dedication event to celebrate the updates and added features to Jack Warren Park! This will be held on Saturday, March 22, from 9-11 a.m. at 7788 Warren Park Dr. In the event of rain, festivities will be held inside the Mary Alice Warren Community Center at 7632 Warren Park Dr.

Attendees will enjoy demonstrations from the Parks, Recreation and Cultural Development Committee. There will also be a dedication of the Mike Horn Amphitheater at this event. Named in honor of Mayor Mike Horn, the new amphitheater recognizes his steadfast leadership and commitment to the Lewisville community.

"We hope these types of projects will continue to nourish our residents and be yet another place where the community can thrive," Town Manager Stacy Tolbert said about the park expansion. "The park improvements were funded by a matching grant from the North Carolina Parks & Recreation Trust Fund. We are grateful for the opportunity this grant has given us and excited about this new space and activities." One of the updates in the expansion is a wonderfully wooded nature trail that provides a relaxing and eventually informative stroll. The 18-hole "Ace Place" disc golf course now threads through the park, offering a unique and exciting challenge for disc golfers and discgolfistas of any level. The Mike Horn Amphitheater also establishes another community gathering spot for events and celebrations.

We hope residents and visitors join the festivities and experience the new additions firsthand.

Spring Bulky Item Pick-Up Begins April 28

The next Bulky Item Pick-Up event will begin Monday, April 28. Lewisville residents wishing to participate in the pick-up should have all acceptable bulky items curbside by 6 a.m. on that day. Waste Management will only make one pass through Town for this pick-up.

Bulky item collection events are held twice a year and provide Lewisville residents with an easy and convenient way to dispose of unwanted. large items that would otherwise need to be taken to the landfill. This event is intended for the disposal of items too large to fit within a trash cart. All items must be in plain view, within three feet of the curb, and can not be bagged or boxed for Bulky Item Pick-Up. Finished scanning and bagging, the lady cashier joined in the wait for the "Remove Card Now" message. In fact, at this point, everyone in the checkout line behind me, which had grown considerably, was also waiting for the "Remove Card Now" message.

Fumbling as we do when things go slightly awry, I reinserted my card, then reinserted it again, hoping for a positive outcome.

What happened next caught me totally off guard.

A somewhat unkempt young man, who could have easily been someone you might see holding a sign at a busy intersection, reached his hand out to me with a twenty-dollar bill in it. He smiled and said, "Here, let me help you."

Whether he was taking pity on a "slightly" older gentleman having trouble using the simplest of technologies or was attempting to spare me the humiliation of not being able to pay for my groceries, it really didn't matter.

It was an unexpected act of kindness occurring between two total strangers.

I have written many times about compassion and kindness. But my context has always been about showing kindness to others,

Similarly, I find it amazingly ironic that throughout my professional career, I most admired those who were successful, but as I have grown older, it is now those who are the kindest that I admire most.

As spring approaches in our little town, I hope your days are filled with the joy of kindness.

grills (no propane), mattresses, box springs (limit of 2 box springs per household), stoves, refrigerators, freezers (doors must be removed), water heaters, and dishwashers.



Partisan Municipal Elections in 2025

In preparation for this year's upcoming elections, candidates are reminded that the process will be partisan. Those intending to align with a political party must take action well in advance of the filing deadline.

According to the Forsyth County Board of Elections, candidates must affiliate with a political party at least 90 days before filing their Notice of Candidacy. Individuals opting to run as unaffiliated candidates must go through the petition process to have their names on the ballot.

As the electoral season approaches, prospective candidates are urged to adhere to these time lines to ensure their eligibility and participation in the electoral process. Visit forsyth.cc/Elections/ or scan the QR code for more information.

Lewisville Acquires Public Works Building

The Town of Lewisville has acquired a new Public Works Building as of October 14, 2024 to better provide services and maintenance for our residents.

The facility is located at 6524 Shallowford Rd. You may recognize the building as the previous Lewisville Post Office.

This new space will be an investment in the town and support road maintenance, community infrastructure, stormwater activities, park upkeep, and so many more essential services provided by our Public Works Department.

"It's a pay-as-we-go project, so we'll work on it as we're able to," Public Works Director Jon Hanna said. "In the next year I'd like to resurface the parking lot and add paved area in the back, and fence in a large portion for secure storage. On the building itself, we're going to add insulated doors to the back, replace the HVAC, and

improve plumbing and lighting. The interior will remain mostly an open flex-space for multiple maintenance uses."

Currently, the inside of the building is being stripped and repainted.

Sound the Alarm: The Life-Saving Power of Smoke Alarms

Your safety is the Lewisville and Vienna Fire Departments' top priority! Smoke alarms are your first line of defense against house fires. Make sure yours are in working order with these simple tips:

Smoke Alarm Awareness

• Placement Matters: Install smoke alarms inside every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of your home, including the basement.

• Be Alert: Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a home fire by half.

How to Check Smoke Alarm Batteries

 Monthly Testing: Press the test button on your smoke alarm. If you hear the beep, it's working!

• Keep It Quiet: If your alarm chirps, it's a sign that the batteries are low and need replacing.

When to Change Smoke Alarm Batteries

· Replace batteries at least once a year, or whenever the alarm signals a low battery.

Consider using long-life batteries for fewer replacements.

Don't Fall for the Call — Stay Scam-Smart

When it comes to phone scams. it's important to be aware and protect yourself from scammers. Here are tips from Lewisville Community Policing's Sergeant Preston Stringer to help you recognize phone scams and how to report scams and fraud.

Recognizing Phone Scams

Scammers will impersonate all levels of law enforcement and other businesses or government organizations.

Scammers can use the real names of Law Enforcement Officers from public records/websites.

Scams often include missing jury duty, failing to pay a fine from a ticket/accident, and more.

Scammers will ask for cash, gift cards, and money apps (Venmo, Cash App, Zelle, PayPal, etc.). These methods of exchange are harder to trace.

HANG UP! If you think someone is trying to scam you over the phone, hang up. Scammers try to use urgency and threats of legal action to scare you, but if you're suspicious of a potential scam, verify with the Sheriff's Office.

We hope you'll come experience and touch this piece of the Yadkin, which has been so important to us historically and continues to be a resource worth paying attention to. We'll have a few kayaks available and you're welcome to bring your own. The first person to spot a Bald Eagle gets a really cool Lewisville license plate. Happy Spring!
