## EV Charging Stations Installed



Electric vehicle (EV) charging station located on David McKee Street across from Shallowford Square

hour, and this fee will pay for the electricity used plus a small amount toward the charging station infrastructure.

These new stations are part of the international Chargepoint network, so motorists can either use their Chargepoint account or simply tap their credit card for service.

New electric vehicle (EV) charging stations have been installed on David McKee Street across from Shallowford Square. Up to four vehicles can be charged simultaneously, thus allowing both residents and visitors alike the opportunity to top up their batteries at a convenient location.

The construction of EV infrastructure aligns with the Town of Lewisville Comprehensive Plan, which recommends strategies to promote sustainability, as well as Town Council Resolution 2021-051 focusing on clean and renewable energy. The construction contract for this project was \$48,305, and it will be partially offset by a \$20,000 rebate award from the North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality. EV users will pay \$0.25 per kilowatt-

**W**hen my wife and I started our advertising business almost 40 years ago, we didn't have great aspirations of what it could become. It was more like how could we survive.

We didn't have any clients to speak of, or at least any that generated regular revenue, and we couldn't find a bank that would loan us money for capitalization. We were a start-up and "too risky" in their words. So initially, we funded our business with our credit cards at 18% interest.

We weren't living paycheck to paycheck back then because once we paid our bills, rent and employees, we didn't have much left over for a regular paycheck.

Needless to say, we didn't eat out much or take vacations or buy a bunch of stuff (except cat food). However, once in a while, we would treat ourselves to a bottle of wine and a ribeye on the grill, when it was on sale at \$3.99 a pound.

I like to quote my Uncle Hop, a west Texas dirt farmer, in describing our first few years as "hard hoeing."

It was a little difficult, but our parents who lived through the Great Depression reminded us that difficult times build good character. And I guess you could say that we became real good characters.

But through hard work, sacrifice, some good breaks and some truly wonderful clients, we grew our business to be among the largest advertising agencies in the Triad.

Please notice the key phrase in that last sentence – "wonderful clients." These were folks who took a chance on us, gave us their business and, without whom, we would not have made it.

So, as I drive through our town today, I think about our

small businesses. Many are like ours when we first started. Good people. Working hard. Not making a lot of money, but willing to take the risk to build something special.

Collectively, they are our local economy, employing our friends, neighbors and kids. They're donating to our schools and organizations. They're shaping and preserving the small-town charm that is Lewisville.

And you know what? Now more than ever, they need our support. So, here's what I'm asking you to do.

The flyer is there, which covers bi-weekly recycling along with Special Events items. Remember, our curbside bins can now take #5 tubs, which cottage cheese and sour cream come in.

If storing clean food containers, plastic grocery bags, fluorescent bulbs and bubble wrap is not your home décor path, you can drop many of these off on your own schedule. Most grocery stores have recycling bins out front for plastic bags and film. Just check for the store drop-off symbol or the triangle with a 2 or 4 inside. These can't go into your curbside bin because flimsy plastics get caught in the gears of recycling equipment.

Goin' Postal and some UPS sites accept clean Styrofoam peanuts and bubble wrap. That's where our volunteers take what comes in during Special Recycling. The 3RC facility on MLK Drive accepts fluorescent bulbs and non-alkaline batteries year-round. So, go for it! But if you can't, come to us from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on David McKee Street by the Square. October 28, save the date!

**Bulky Item Pickup to Begin October 16**

The next Bulky Item Pickup event will start Monday, October 16. Those residents wishing to participate in the pickup should have all acceptable bulky items curbside by 6 a.m. that day. Items placed out late will not be removed.

Bulky item collection events provide Lewisville residents an easy and convenient way to dispose of unwanted, large items that would otherwise need to be taken to the landfill. Town Hall has received recent calls about the event, so Town staff is anticipating high participation from Lewisville residents.

This event is intended for disposal of items too large to fit

within a trashcan: items such as large pieces of furniture, carpet, mattresses, box springs and white goods. Town staff notes the “rule of thumb” is to avoid placing bags of trash, televisions, cardboard boxes, lumber scraps, clothing, books, construction debris and other prohibited items out for the collection. If Waste Management sees a contaminated collection pile, the site will not be serviced.

It’s amazing what you can learn following a trash truck all day. In July, another staff member and I had the pleasure of participating with our waste collection contractor in a house count. We followed each truck, on each route, to every single home in Lewisville that receives trash collection, with the goal of updating the census in this town that has grown throughout the last few years. The opportunity was educational and enlightening. I was especially awed by the work ethic and dedication of the drivers and supervisors that are responsible for making this happen every week. They are up long before the sun and the schedule is grinding and relentless. I encourage you to consider these hard-working men and women and do everything you can to make your home easy to service.

Please have your carts out by 6 a.m., with plenty of space between them, and not overflowing with awkward refuse. If you watch the arm work on these trucks, it is not able to lift loads of construction debris or old furniture, and un-bagged material can spill out, only for the driver to have to stop and clean up. Also, please make sure your cars and sports goals are clear of the cul-de-sacs.

Additionally, I was often alarmed at how hard some addresses are to locate. Please look at your home and the homes of your loved ones and especially consider what emergency personnel may see (or not see) when looking for you. Have clear numbers on your mailbox as well as your house and keep an eye on vegetation that may obscure them. Time lost trying to find your house could be critical in an emergency situation!
